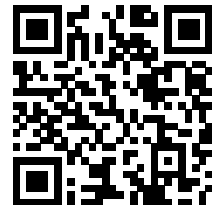

# Battle of Kinsale Impact



In the late 16th century, \_\_\_\_\_ was the scene of significant military and political activity.
