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# The Gunpowder Plot Uncovered



In 1605, a group of Catholic conspirators, including \_\_\_\_\_ Fawkes, planned to blow up the Houses of Parliament in London. Their goal was to end Protestant rule by assassinating King \_\_\_\_\_ I and replacing him with a Catholic monarch.
