The aftermath of the	plot had severe consequences for Catholic	s in England. Anti-Catholic
	grew, and harsher laws were imposed a	gainst them. This event deeply
impacted the relation	nship between the	and its subjects, illustrating the
lengths to which som	e were willing to go to defend their	
King James's reactio	n to the plot was measured; he admired the	loyalty of those who came forward
with the letter, which	had saved his life and the lives of his	members. The
Gunpowder Plot is re	membered annually on November 5th with fi	reworks and bonfires, symbolizing
